

# Understanding rash

## Rash was the most common side effect of RASONQUE in the clinical trial

Rash is red, dry skin and/or small bumps that commonly occur on your neck, back, and face. Rash can be mild, moderate, or severe.

**87% of people who received RASONQUE in the clinical trial developed a rash.**

**74%** developed a mild or moderate rash

**13%** developed a severe rash

## Guidelines to help prevent and manage rash

### TAKE CARE OF YOUR SKIN



**Before you start treatment with RASONQUE, your care team may prescribe certain medications or creams for use on your skin, which may help to minimize rash. Use as directed.**

**Other actions you should take that may help to prevent and manage rash include:**



Using a scent-free and soothing moisturizing cream to keep your skin hydrated



Limiting sun exposure and wearing protective clothing, including a hat, if you are in the sun



Using sunscreen that is SPF 30 or higher. Apply at least 30 minutes before going out into the sun. Reapply every 2 hours

- ✓ Keeping your skin clean; consider using an over-the-counter antiseptic spray (eg, hypochlorous acid)
- ✓ Using warm (not hot) water while bathing

**If your rash is more severe (bleeding or painful), your care team may have additional directions for how to manage it.**

## INDICATION

RASONQUE is a prescription medicine used to treat adults with a type of pancreatic cancer called pancreatic adenocarcinoma:

- that has spread to other parts of the body, **and**
- who have received at least 1 prior treatment or who cannot receive a combination of cancer treatments.

It is not known if RASONQUE is safe and effective in children.

## SELECT IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION

### What is the most important information I should know about RASONQUE?

**RASONQUE can cause serious side effects, including:** skin reactions, swelling or sores in the mouth (stomatitis), diarrhea, tears in your stomach or intestines (gastrointestinal perforation), and lung or breathing problems (pneumonitis). RASONQUE can harm your unborn baby.

### The most common side effects of RASONQUE include:

- rash
- diarrhea
- swelling or sores in the mouth
- nausea
- tiredness or weakness
- vomiting
- stomach (abdominal) pain
- swelling in the arms and legs
- decreased appetite
- bleeding

**These are not all the possible side effects of RASONQUE.** Call your doctor for medical advice about side effects.
